When they read independently, they should read books in range of their lexile levels. Let's work together to get all of our students reading on grade level.

Kindergarten News

First Grade News

We have made it through the first 30+ days of school with great success. Kudos to you for sending your child/children to school every day with their uniforms on and ready to learn.

We have been working very hard with the Dolch Sight Word list. We are on our way to reading and writing those words in context. We are asking you to go over the assigned word list every day with your child. This will ensure that your child will build a strong foundation as we get ready for reading various leveled-texts.

In math, we are working on counting and writing numbers from 1 to 120. It is important for first graders to understand the sequence and patterns of numbers. Please monitor home assignments daily.

Second Grade News

We have already completed two months of school and your child should have received a progress report by now. As you can see, much work needs to be done. The second grade has been working on place value in math, the five regions of Georgia in social studies, and life cycles in science. In the upcoming weeks, your child will be assessed on this information and many of the themes will change. Please help your child to be successful by discussing/reviewing his/her science, math, and social studies information daily. As always, continue to check your child's bag for important notices from the school and his/her homework assignments.

Grade Three News

The Third Grade Team is excited to inform you that our students are growing in knowledge! In math, the unit Number and Operations in Base Ten will culminate with a performance assessment. The students will create and publish a book to demonstrate what they have learned in the unit. In ELA, the students are detectives! They are participating in close readings of a variety of texts to describe characters and explain how their actions impact the plot. In social studies, the students are discussing the lives of Americans who expanded people's rights and freedoms. Lastly, in science the students are examining how traits help plants and animals adapt and survive in their environment. Please help us build a strong school-to-home connection by discussing these important concepts and helping your child with homework at home. In addition, please continue to replenish school supplies throughout the year and donate and send in healthy snacks for the students to eat. Thanks so much!

Grade Four News

The fourth grade team is rapidly approaching the end of the first nine weeks. Wow, how time does fly! Our current focus areas are:

- Reading Skill: character analysis, story elements
- Language Arts: prefixes and suffixes, plural nouns
- · Social Studies: Explorers
- Science: physical and behavioral adaptations
- · Math: addition/subtraction and multiplication

Please, be sure that each student reads for at least 20 minutes daily and study multiplication facts.

Grade Five News

We are off and running. Our focus this year is MASTERY of the content standards. What does this mean? It means that students must learn, retain, and demonstrate their knowledge on both multiple choice and constructed response (written-essay) test items. This eliminates guessing and requires our students to think critically and communicate their understanding of concepts with explanations and examples. As a result, you may notice a decline in your child's grades. However, this is a necessary step as we march towards meeting and exceeding the new state requirements and middle school. Clearly, more study time is needed and additional opportunities for students to express themselves in writing is a must. Also, please make sure your child has the proper tools (pencil, paper, books, eyeglasses, etc.) and the proper amount of rest in order to be successful. In closing, the fifth grade staff and students would like to say kudos to our students of the month- Jimmia Flanders and Tenia Dunn! These two young ladies exemplify being kind, cooperative and respectful.
